## Shaking Things Up: UB Participates in the National Earthquake Drill

The UB Community showcased their commitment to safety and preparedness by actively participating in the Nationwide Simulation Earthquake Drill (NSED) for the fourth quarter of 2 conducted in coordination with the City Mayor and with the assistance from the Baguio Traffic Enforcement Unit (TEU). Students, teachers, and school staff from all levels of the university executed the "Duck, Cover and Hold" procedure during the 1-minute-long siren, after which they exited the buildings and proceeded to their designated evacuations zones, which included the UB car park and the school grounds of the neighboring Saint Louis School Center.

Atty. Romel P. Ayson, the university's Vice President for Administration, oversaw the coordination of a task force to guarantee the seamless execution of the drill, minimizing any significant disruptions. The effective coordination of the Risk Management Office (RMO), under the leadership of Engr. Julia Flores, and the Campus Planning and Development Office (CPDO), headed by Engr. Bernard Abaya, played a crucial role in overseeing the crowds and facilitating the smooth flow of foot traffic. Their efforts were focused on preventing any congestion on roads and walkways.



#### **UBHS** Students and Faculty Gain Insights and **Initiatives at Youth on Food Systems Workshop**

University of Baguio High School (UBHS) students and faculty attended the Youth on Food Systems Workshop, a collaborative effort organized by the City Planning, Development, and Sustainability Office and World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). Hosted at Travelite Hotel in Baguio City on October 21, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., the workshop, themed "Youth Engagement: Sustaining Relevance and Strengthening Resilience, addressed the global challenges of a burgeoning population and the consequential environmental impact of heightened food demand.

Mayor Benjie Magalong's keynote message, delivered by Councilor Jose Molintas, set the tone for the event. The whole workshop was divided into four parts. The first part was an introduction of the topic on sustainable food systems, which was presented by Monci Hinay, a representative from WWF. Hinay provided a comprehensive overview of a sustainable food system, explained the concepts of food security and its four aspects, and addressed the urban-rural linkages of food security, sustainable production, and food loss. An interactive Q&A session followed which allowed students, teachers, and organizers to exchange views and raise their questions. One of the UBHS participants




experiences related to the topic, significantly enriching the overall discussion.







Liberating ourselves from the clutches of social media need not be a solitary endeavor; face-to-face social interactions, such as spending quality time with friends and family, offer a potent antidote to the escalating attachment to the World Wide Web. In the pursuit of a healthier digital balance, these alternatives provide not only respite but also avenues for personal growth and meaningful connections that extend beyond the allure of the online realm.

student organization LPU Kasarian to incorporate two gender-neutral restrooms. Ateneo de Davao marked a significant move in September 2016 by establishing all-gender restrooms, while the University of Baguio features a gender-neutral restroom on the ground floor of the A building.

The shift in the usual has now brought up discussions on whether it is appropriate or just a 'stunt'. Critics may argue that such changes are unnecessary or that they defy tradition. Stakeholders, especially parents who are against this change have been questioning the safety and reliability. They express that this may bring more violence especially, but not limited to women. Some also highly oppose this for religious matters. However, it is crucial to recognize that this shift is not about discarding tradition but evolving with the times. It is about adapting to a more comprehensive understanding of gender and acknowledging the needs of all individuals within the school community. The move towards

gender-neutral restrooms in schools is a step towards breaking down barriers, challenging stereotypes, and creating a culture of inclusivity that extends beyond the restroom walls.



# Navigating the Depths of Educational Stagnation: The Philippines' PISA Predicament



PISA, designed to evaluate the knowledge of 15-year-old students in science, mathematics, reading, and application skills, released its findings in December 2023, indicating that the Philippines scored an estimated 100 to 120 points below the average. Each 20-point decline represents a year lagging behind the average pace of other nations—an "uncomfortable truth", as aptly stated by Vice President Sara Duterte and the Department of Education (DepEd) secretary.

To understand the disparity between the Philippines' education system and the average-scoring counterparts, there is a need to understand the various factors, including the impact of the pandemic, subject load, bullying, health conditions, and socio-economic status. Financial considerations also greatly affect the results, as highlighted by another PISA assessment linking the amount of financial support to learning quality. While the average allocated funds for a student over 10 years is \$77,000 in surveyed countries, the Philippines only earmarks \$11,000 or around Php 618, 000.00 for the same duration.

Many reactions were received from the people when the PISA report was released. Some attribute the poor performance to ingrained cultural attitudes, pointing to a normalization of practices like laziness, cheating, skipping classes, and the rise of Artificial

Intelligence (AI) in the learning landscape. Others place blame on the K-12 curriculum, implemented in 2012-2013, which failed to deliver the promised improvements, resulting in a perceived brain drain and financial strain for an additional two years of schooling. Despite all the commotions, DepEd contends that the results showcase the country's resilience, emphasizing the retention of similar results from the 2018 PISA assessments. However, one must question whether the few variations are considered as a good thing, or are they merely interpreted as a hopeful response to the nation's persistent underperformance.

From a student's perspective, there could be probable solutions to address the problem such as providing teacher training and support, conducting promoting academic honesty, and increasing community engagement and parental involvement. First, providing extensive training for teachers to adapt to modern teaching methodologies, incorporating technology and interactive methods would make learning more engaging. Second, reevaluating the K-12 curriculum would help identify areas that need improvement and assess if there is a need to adjust the curriculum to align with current educational needs and global standards. Third, the government must allocate resources effectively to ensure that schools in all regions receive adequate support. Fourth, schools must craft guidelines or school policies regarding students' dishonest practices and discourage cheating or the overdependence on AI. Lastly, establishing and fostering stronger connections between schools and communities would encourage parents to actively participate in their children's education.

The Philippines faces a concerning educational predicament reflected in the PISA rankings. Despite minimal improvements since the last assessment, there is hope in student-centric solutions like better teacher training, curriculum updates, fairer financial allocation, emphasis on academic honesty, and stronger community involvement. The key now is turning these ideas into actionable reforms for a brighter future.


## A Symphony of Broken Dreams:

In the heart of Tarlac and Laguna, a green revolution is taking place as asparagus cultivation gains momentum, thanks to the innovative efforts of Sonny Tan and his business partner, Jeffrey Dimatula. What was once a per-

sonal experiment with asparagus seeds from Taiwan has blossomed

into a thriving business that not only contributes to the local economy but also

the myriad health benefits of asparagus to Filipino tables.

Asparagus, a familiar green vegetable recognized for its long, slender spears, has found its way to the Philippines, with Tan and Dimatula at the forefront of its cultivation. The duo owns a vast 200-hectare land in Tarlac and another farm in Laguna, where they have been successfully growing asparagus since 2015.

Originating from a genus of the family Asparagaceae with up to 300 spe-

cies, asparagus is a versatile vege-

> table commonly prepared by grilling, steaming, or roasting (The Spruce Eats, 2022). Besides being a culinary delight, it packs a nutritional punch, of-

fering essential nutrients such as fiber, vitamin C, folate, vitamin K crucial for blood clotting and bone health, and chromium, which may aid insulin function (Eat Well, 2022).

Initially planting asparagus for personal consumption, Tan and Dimatula soon recognized its vast potential and decided to turn their passion into a business. They now offer their harvest at 350 pesos journey from personal experimentation per kilo for wholesale and 400 pesos per kilo for retail. With an impressive daily harvest of 100 kilos, their produce has made its way to various cities including Baguio, Angeles, and Manila.

Ensuring the safety and organic nature of their asparagus, Tan and Dimatula utilize chicken manure as fertilizer, aligning with the growing trend towards sustainable and eco-friendly farming practices.

Asparagus, once primarily viewed as a side dish, has now become a versatile ingredient inspiring culinary creativity in the kitchen. Beyond being a standalone vegetable, it can be incorporated into a variety of dishes, further enhancing its appeal as a staple in Filipino households.

Frozen in Time: A Groundbreaking Discovery Unveils Paths to Successful Organ

In contemporary times, organ shortages persist as a global issue for both humans and animals. On average, only 25% of patients worldwide awaiting organ transplants receive successful procedures annually (Kloc, 2022). One of the causes of this transplantation failure is the inadequate preservation and rewarming of organs. This scarcity has prompted an increased demand for donors and driven scientists, including curious engineers and medical researchers at the University of Minnesota Twin Cities, to seek solutions.

In a monumental stride towards addressing the organ shortage crisis, engineers and medical researchers from the University of Minnesota have achieved a revolutionary success. Utilizing cryopreservation, a process that preserves cells, tissues, or other biological samples by cooling them to very low temperatures, rat kidneys were successfully stored for up to 100 days. Following the required preservation period, the University of Minnesota developed a groundbreaking technique, termed the "nanowarming" process, which successfully warmed the organs and allowed for transplantation into rats with full kidney function.

In contrast to traditional methods, the nanowarming innovation rapidly and evenly warms the organs, eliminating freezing fluids and tiny particles, thus facilitating a smoother transplant process. This process involves dispersing tiny iron oxide particles in a protective solution that circulates through the organ's blood vessels. When triggered by electromagnetic waves, these nanoparticles act as small heaters. Importantly, the tiny iron oxide particles can be washed out after rewarming. Notably, the University of Minnesota's process did not require rats to receive medication or dialysis during transplantation, yet they not only survived but also maintained full kidney function, a notable deviation from the complex interventions required for human transplants.

Currently, about 20% of donated kidneys cannot be transplanted each year due to the organ's limited preservation time and recipients not reaching the transplant site in time. Additionally, some kidneys, after rewarming, incur significant damage from ice or cracking. The development of

nanowarming provides scientists worldwide with a promising method for preserving and transplanting kidneys without causing damage to the organ.

While human testing is a few years away, the findings from this research are important. This breakthrough instills hope in solving the organ shortage problem and has the potential to reshape the landscape of organ transplants. The impact of this new method extends beyond the laboratory, fostering optimism among experts that cryopreserved organs could offer a viable solution to the ongoing challenge of insufficient organs for medical transplants.



## Pinyapel: Crafting Pages of Greener Opportunities By Euwea Naycelle Alhambra The use of traditional papers is said to be safer in current times, rather than plastics. However, both the production of traditional paper and plastic can truly harm the environment. The production of these is mainly associated with deforestation, agricultural wastes, pollution, chemical-intensive processes, environmental degradation like global warming, and the harming of living things. However, while seeking solutions to tackle these challenges, the Design Center of the Philippines, in partnership with Cagayan de Oro Handmade Papercraft, Nature's Fresh, and IdeaTechs Packaging, has created an innovative product. This serves as

The product's design is reported to have been guided by two objectives established by the Design Center of the Philippines: minimizing agricultural waste and addressing deforestation. Its production includes the reuse and recycling of discarded Pineapple leaves. The process of making Pinyapel starts with the extraction of fibers from the Pineapple leaves. These fibers will undergo a mechanical processing method (involving crushing, pressing, and drying of the fibers) without the need for the chemicals typically used in traditional paper production. After the mechanical process, a pulp will be created which can be used to make papers. These papers can now be crafted into items such as boxes, packaging, paper bags, coffee cups, and various other products that utilize paper.

The Philippines is the second biggest producer of pineapples worldwide. With this, Pinyapel will not only solve environmental issues brought about by the production of paper and plastic like deforestation, agricultural wasting, pollution, and more, but it will also help the country's pineapple farmers by giving them more job opportunities and an increase of income. "This endeavor not only raises the bar for the design and value of the Philippine products but also makes (a) meaningful contribution to the global movement advocating for environmentally friendly sound practices and a holistic approach to sustainable development -- economic, cultural, social and environmentally sustainability," stated by Senate President Pro Tempore Loren Legarda at the Senate building in Pasay


